• How important it is to learn about other people's cultures?

• How can we benefit from learning about other cultures?

 Several ways that people can benefit from other cultures are in business, personal relationships, and just in self-improvement. In business, it is necessary to know a little bit about whatever culture you plan to work with. For instance, I think in Muslim cultures, shaking hands with your left hand is considered extremely rude. If you didn't know that, it could hurt your chances of doing business. Also, it's important just to improve yourself by learning as much as you can, and culture is a good subject. • What do you think is the best way to learn about another culture?

Obviously, the best way to learn about a culture is to go there and experience it. If you can get
a feel for the culture firsthand, it will be a lot easier to pick things up. But I also believe that you
can learn a ton about other cultures just by reading books about them. Reading about people's
experiences in foreign lands is the next best thing to being there.

 Do you think it's better to go overseas to study a foreign language or to study it in your home country?

 I think it is better to study a language in its native country. When you do that, you are engulfed in the language and forced to encounter it outside of the classroom. Otherwise, your only exposure to the language is when you're studying or in the classroom. I know firsthand that when learning a foreign language in your home country, it is easy to lose what you have learned. • What benefits can there be for people working in a foreign country?

Working in a foreign country offers both personal and economic benefits to people. At a
personal level, they can enjoy a higher standard of living. Their knowledge about cultural
differences and languages also develops. Professionally, the work environment gives them
greater exposure which improves their professional skills. More importantly, international work
experience which people gain is highly valued by employers.

• Do you believe in stereotypes about different nationalities?

 It's is a difficult question. In my view, the nationality and character of a person are two different things. Stereotypes about different nationalities are just based on people's observations. They may or may not be accurate. I think that stereotypes don't reflect reality. So, I don't believe in them. • Are you in favour of adopting a universal language?

• Certainly, adopting a global language would make our life easier. But languages and cultures are inextricably intertwined. So, if we choose to have a common language, the cultural diversity will disappear. The loss will be irreparable. I don't think it's a wise idea to adopt a universal language.

• What negative effects might come from a country losing its traditional cultures?

• The loss of traditional cultures can affect a country in many ways. If there are businesses based on traditional skills, cultural loss can affect the economy of a country. Since traditional cultures represent a country, major changes in cultures can have an impact on tourism in that country. • What is your understanding of the term "globalization"?

Globalization, in my mind, is the idea that the world is becoming smaller, so societies can
interact and exchange culture more easily and more efficiently. Unfortunately, because some
countries are richer and have more influence than others, certain cultures get spread around
more than others. On the whole, however, globalization is a good thing because it is not the
only culture that gets spread, but things like information and medicine can help people.

• Do you think globalization is a good thing?

Yes, globalization has its problems, but for the most part, it is good for most people involved.
 Some people have different opinions because they are really concerned with the loss of culture, but for me, the benefits outweigh the drawbacks. People have access to more information, so diseases can be better treated, food can be made more efficiently, and goods that make people's lives easier are now available.

- I'm going to talk about a book that really made me think, and that has had a positive effect on my life. The
 name of the book is 'Atomic Habits', and it's about the compounding effect that small decisions and
 minuscule (/'mIn@skjuIl/) changes can have on people's lives.
- I decided to read Atomic Habits after seeing an interview with the book's author, James Clear, who is a world-renowned expert in the field of habit formation. In the interview, he told inspiring stories and revealed some simple life hacks that can make people more productive, motivated and happy. I found the whole idea of the 'science of tiny habits' fascinating, and so I bought the book straight away.
- While reading the book, I was forced to confront my own habits and behaviours. I realized that I'm nowhere near as productive as I could be, but that some small tweaks to my routine could make a significant and long-lasting difference. The book also gave me a framework to understand how good habits are formed and how bad habits can be broken. It has encouraged me to analyze my own habits accordingly.
- I thoroughly enjoyed reading Atomic Habits because I thought it was well researched, well reasoned and well
 written. The author's ideas and advice aren't simply his opinions; they are taken from cutting-edge research
 and real success stories. I enjoy reading books that change my way of thinking in some way or give me
 practical, life-altering ideas, and this was definitely one of those books.

I have spent most of my time learning English and western culture. But I did have an interesting experience about a year and a half ago that inspired me to learn about Costa Rican culture. One of my friends spent a semester abroad in Costa Rica in early 2019, and I spent two weeks at the beginning of the summer visiting him there. Prior to visiting, I knew almost nothing about the culture, but staying there, even for such a short time, really opened my eyes. Costa Rican culture is extremely different from either American or Chinese cultures. Two of the phrases most often used in Costa Rica are a good illustration of their culture: Pura Vida and Tranquilo. Pura Vida means "pure life" and Tranquilo means "calm". Both are used in situations where the level of stress is rising. When Costa Ricans say this phrase, they are telling themselves "Don't worry. Chill out." It's an extremely **laid-back**, relaxed culture. Their main goal in life is to be happy. Workdays tend to be shorter, and since the country is so small and borders both the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, it is really easy to go to the beach, so many do just that. When I was there, it was routine to see people getting up around 6 am, go to the beach and surf for two or three hours, work from 10-4, go home and eat, then go back to the beach. It was great to see a culture with such a different outlook on life.

Japan has a distinct, fascinating culture, both modern and traditional, that is unlike any other countries, and will leave a lasting impression on any person. Besides, since this particular culture brings people from all over the world for a common cause, that is to enjoy the stunning beauty of mother nature, it offers all of them a chance to understand and appreciate each other and thus bringing peace and harmony in a world, which is otherwise full of hatred and animosity.
